Happy to report


- 70% increase in funding to DSpace/ Fedora projects in 2013, \$708,870




Adoption of platforms over time




Continued adoption around the world, particularly developing Countries




Diversified Funding Streams \$1.8 million 2013




In 2009 organization was 100% grant funded, today only 23% comes from grants

How is funding allocated?






Sponsorship 2013

Sponsorship Growth








2013 Sponsorship by Geography

- 2013 achievements

 - Successful incubation of VIVO, hiring dedicated Project Director now
 - Release of DSpace 4.0

Why Membership?

- Increase community support
 - For many institutions, "Sponsorship" is a no-no! (Implies charitable contribution)
 - More institutions are budgeted for memberships; fewer for sponsorships
- Membership is consistent with our move towards participatory governance



Membership Levels

 Join at any level you want. Initial mapping is from same Sponsorship level:

Diamond: \$30,000

Platinum: \$20,000

- Gold: \$10,000

- Silver: \$ 5,000

- Bronze: \$ 2,500

 Membership benefits to motivate joining at higher levels...




Membership has its Privileges, e.g.:
