have Travis CI properly configured in our GitHub codebase...

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Travis CI is complaining about something other than your code ;)

integration in action (even if it was the "yellow warning") :)

1.7.3 ready, too
(3:22:58 \ PM) tdonohue: So, it sounds like that's the remainder of the updates on 3.2 / 1.8.3 / 1.7.3.
The last step after those releases will be the announcements to lists...which I have (mostly) ready
(3:24:12 PM) tdonohue: Next on the agenda is 4.0 planning. This is obviously an ongoing topic on the
agenda. Mainly, just a reminder here that we need to set some release timelines soon. Wondering if we
need to start this discussion on dspace-release?

1.7, shout at me if you need me
(3:26:12 PM) mhwood: I will send a note to dspace-release to get some discussion started.
(3:27:25 PM) tdonohue: sounds good mhwood. That's probably the best place to start to iron it out...
although we have quite a few people here, not so many committers today actually.

(3:28:47 PM) hpottinger: mhwood, last time around, for the schedule, Robin just revamped the previous
schedule with new dates, and proposed that as the new schedule. During the process, Tim suggested adding
two deadlines
(3:29:48 PM) hpottinger: so, my suggestion would be similar: propose a schedule based on the previous
one, and let people agree to it, it's easier than discussing schedule design from scratch, I think
(3:30:23 PM) tdonohue: +1 in past we've always usually based the "new proposed dates" on the last
release. Just easier that way.
(3:31:21 PM) tdonohue: but, we should feel free to tweak it as needed... No need to keep the same set
of deadlines, it can be changed as we see fit
(3:31:25 PM) mhwood: I'm still toying with the idea that each sizable contribution needs its own
schedule, so that it may be possible to somewhat coordinate landing dates. Of course, creative work is
hard to keep to a rigid schedule....

would be involved in reminding folks of their promised "schedule"
(3:32:55 PM) mhwood: Using the previous schedule is a good way to set dates generally, and then point
out that we would like to spread landing dates for features out a bit ahead of those dates where

to try to avoid the "everything is contributed in the last week before the deadline" syndrome of past
releases (3.x especially)

(3:35:31 PM) hpottinger: little merges should be pushed by their own committers (IMHO) :-) while "max
day" was good fun last year, I would prefer not to do things that way again
(3:35:36 PM) mhwood: Exactly. I think it would help to ask people to "sign up" for landing dates in
advance of the general dates, to give us some time to straighten out any conflicts.

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email to dspace-devel to also try and raise attention/awareness

mapping doesn't affect it. That seems to fit with the static inheritance model that we use now. I
don't think that a Collection needs to be "owned" by a Community; it's just a handy place to get default
permissions at creation and means nothing afterward.

(3:52:29 PM) mhwood: I see that I'm assuming, here, that a Collection is created in a single Community
and then mapped later.

was created" the "owning Community" for that collection. Same as how the "Collection in which an item
was created" is the "owning Collection" for that item.

Request branch fails to build -- it'll warn the committers to about the PR

PeterDietz. I plan to start using it soon myself, as it looks very cool

interested), we could also start our own "Travis CI tips" (if needed) on the DSpace wiki. Though, from
what I've seen so far, it seems pretty easy to get running quickly

they will ensure it keeps on running and, running updated projects, and finding resources to do builds.
